A Letter From the PRESIDENT

On July 2, we will celebrate lowa being the 10th state to ratify the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution giving women the right to vote. Iowa has a long legacy of recognizing the equality of its citizens, modifying the Constitution as early as 1868 to enfranchise Black and Native American men. The concept of the inclusion of women was believed to be passed shortly thereafter, but a number of occurrences sidetracked the passage.

The story of women's suffrage in our country and state is a colorful one, lest you think our current political situation is an aberration. The road to the vote was rife with pragmatic strategies, scandals, and powerful business opposition. There was the

"free love" scandal of 1871, which had women's groups in Polk County taking a "purist pledge," and the suffragist movement aligning itself with WWI, staging protests in front of the White House to sway public opinion AND President Wilson. Given that women were perceived as the moral conscience, the 19th Amendment was opposed by big liquor producers. Cultural and economic concerns were raised by some labor organizations and the southern states. Tennessee ratified the amendment in 1920 creating the 2/3 state majority needed for ratification. (Mississippi finally ratified the amendment in 1984.)

Today, the Iowa Women's Foundation continues the challenge of making lives better for women and girls. Through public advocacy, research, and partnerships with community stakeholders and businesses, we are making progress toward providing quality and affordable child care for the 361,000 vacancies for children in our state, which in turn empowers their mothers with economic opportunity to support their families.

In closing, I'd like to juxtapose two very different quotes. First, we celebrate (as the cigarette brand Virginia Slims campaign put it) that "[We've] come a long way, baby." But to paraphrase Robert Frost's final lines in *Stopping by the Woods on a Snowy Evening*, "[We] have miles to go before [we] sleep."

Dr. Angela Sadler Williamson




ngela Sadler Williamson, Ph.D., is an independent filmmaker, speaker, and adjunct instructor in the Communication Studies Department at Concordia University Irvine. A former producer and copywriter for the Orange County NewsChannel, Fox 11 Television, Fox Sports West, and Prime Ticket, Dr. Williamson has over 25 years

of experience in the broadcast television, cable advertising, healthcare, financial, municipal government, and higher education industries.

A multiple Telly Award recipient, Dr. Williamson has a doctorate in Human Services with a specialization in Management of Nonprofit Agencies from Capella University in Minnesota. She is also the 2019 recipient of the *Belle Babb Mansfield Award* and has been featured in *Women Who Rock with Success* and *Black Girls Allowed* magazines, and *Civil Women* on PBS.

Dr. Williamson is currently a member of P.E.O. Sisterhood, serving as the Publicity Chairperson for the Inland Empire and the Writers Guild of America West. In December 2018, she released her award-winning documentary about her cousin Rosa Parks, *My Life with Rosie*, on Amazon Prime. In August 2019, she will release her first book. *Women Who Illuminate*.

In 1994, the Foundation's mission was fourfold: 1) to serve lowa women through training and consultation, 2) to develop women's philanthropy, 3) to act as an umbrella agency for funding women's projects, and 4) to provide direct grants for endeavors shown to improve the lives of women and girls.

These projects have promoted social change, economic development, leadership development, self-employment initiatives, management training, housing equity, and so much more.

Today, we continue our mission with ever growing support from our community partners, local businesses, volunteers, and allies. Together, we've been able to accomplish a lot since our founding:

- We have researched issues and conducted statewide tours to help communities self-identify the struggles that women and girls continue to face.
- Through fact sheets, information sessions, and research reports, we have educated ourselves and others on the issues at hand to better understand the obstacles and how to tackle them.
- We continue the work to shatter the barriers to women's economic self-sufficiency: Employment, Child Care, Housing, Education/Training, Transportation, and Mentoring.
- To date, we have awarded more than \$870,000 in grants to over 200 programs benefiting thousands of women and girls in all 99 lowa counties.

- Through the Building Community Child Care Solutions Tour, we've helped (and continue to help) 25 communities increase the accessibility and affordability of quality child care—our biggest initiative to date!
- We've rallied our communities to work together.
 The IWF Board of Directors, Advisory Council,
 advisory teams in Des Moines and the Cedar
 Valley—along with hundreds of statewide
 volunteers—are collaborating to improve the lives
 of lowa's women and girls from Council Bluffs to
 the Quad Cities and everywhere in between.

We've had much to celebrate over the years. As we look to the future, we will continue working to improve the lives of lowa's women and girls—the very mission set forth by our founders. With our supporters standing by our side, together we are stronger!

A WIN FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD IOWA

Recently passed legislation will increase funding to Early Childhood Iowa (ECI), a state-run organization and IWF partner that has played an instrumental role in our Building Community Child Care Solutions work.

The measure, House File 758, was signed into effect on May 13, marking the first funding increase to ECI


since 2008. Funds will be allocated to ECI in order to improve the quality of early care, health, and education programs; support the professional development of early care professionals; and expand access to home visiting programs and quality preschool and child care programs.

For the past year, IWF and our many nonprofit partners have been calling on state legislators to address lowa's child care crisis, starting with an increase in funding to Early Childhood lowa. While this measure is by no means an end-all solution to the many issues facing lowa's working parents, House File 758 is a step in the right direction. We applaud state lawmakers for their bipartisan support and will continue to work to make sure this is just one part of a multi-faceted approach to tackling this complex issue.

SOLUTIONS TOUR

The Building Community Child Care Solutions initiative continues across the state as awareness for the child care crisis grows. Businesses, community leaders, government officials, families, and providers are all coming to the table to work together to increase the availability and affordability of quality child care. NOW ACCEPTING – COMMUNITY CHILD CARE SOLUTIONS FUND LETTERS OF INTEREST

The lowa Women's Foundation (IWF) is currently accepting Letters of Interest for the Community Child Care Solutions Fund (CCCSF). This fund is in its 3rd year and is designated to improve the lives of lowa's women and girls through efforts directly related to creating solutions to the state's child care crisis. The funds in the CCCSF are invested in organizations and institutions focused on innovative and sustainable strategies ensuring access to affordable, quality child care that decreases the work force gap and, ultimately, increases women's economic security across lowa.

Interested applicants may submit Letters of Interest (LOI) on letterhead detailing the project they wish to be considered for funding. Letters must be submitted no later than Thursday, August 1, 2019, 5:00 p.m. CST via email: grants@iawf.org.

All LOIs will be reviewed and each applicant will be notified by September 1, 2019 of their status. Those moving to the next round will be asked to complete a more detailed application. Final selections will be made in November. Recipients will be invited to a check presentation in January 2020. Funding is to be used in the 2020 calendar year.
